PSP/CBD Research Update and Practical Conference

Nine US researchers provide updates on the latest PSP and CBD research. In the practical sessions, we hear from a neurologist, a neuro-ophthalmologist, a social worker, a physical therapist, a speech therapist, someone with CBD, someone with PSP, and a caregiver to someone with PSP. This February 2014 conference, organized by UCSF and Brain Support Network, features Dr. Adam Boxer among other UCSF Memory and Aging Center clinicians.
